## **Lafayette Fire Prevention Division**

### **Overview**

The Fire Prevention Division is staffed by an Assistant Chief & 4 full-time Fire Inspectors whose primary responsibilities include:

- **Public Education through Media (print, radio, TV and social)**
  - Schools (Annual Fire Prevention Show with the “Fire House” Band)
  - Juvenile Fire Setter Education Program
  - Through Media (print, radio, TV and Social)
  - Free Smoke Alarms and Installation
  - Community “Outreach” events, such as:
    - ✓ Harrison High School Career Day
    - ✓ Neighborhood Association Meetings
    - ✓ Emergency Preparedness Planning
    - ✓ Wellness Fairs
    - ✓ Tippecanoe County 4-H Fair
- **Building and Fire Code Enforcement for Existing Commercial Buildings**
  - Annual/Tri-Annual Periodic Fire and Life Safety Inspections
- **Plan Review and Inspections of New Construction Projects**
  - Review New Construction/Additions/Remodels
- **Liaison to Engineering Department (meet with building owners/architects/contractors)**
  1. Review Building, Sprinkler, Fire Alarm, Kitchen Hood, Paint Booth Plans
  2. Conduct New Building Inspections from beginning to end of project

## ***2017 Year in Review***

The Fire Prevention Division conducted 3430 fire inspections in existing businesses in 2017. That is an increase of 1003 inspections from 2016. This can be attributed to increased productivity of personnel and being at full staffing levels in the division the entire year.

Inspections of fire protection systems in new construction projects and inspections of new construction projects both saw significant increases from last year. 280 inspections of fire protection systems in new construction were conducted as well as 650 inspections of new construction projects. This is an increase of 181 new construction inspections and 79 new fire protection system inspections from 2016.

Fires investigated by the Investigations Unit totaled 48 which represent a decrease of one incident from 2016 and the number of fires determined to be caused by incendiary/arson actions decreased by 9.

There was 1 **civilian fire fatality** reported by the Lafayette Fire Department for the year 2017.



## ***Public Education***

### **Sparky the Fire Dog**

The Lafayette Fire Prevention Division uses Sparky the Fire Dog, the best known figure in fire prevention, as an exciting tool for teaching fire and safety awareness. 2017 saw an update to this costume that was used in the Fire Prevention Show to dance and interact with the children in attendance. Sparky also made an appearance during the Lafayette Christmas Parade.

### **“Annual” FIRE PREVENTION SHOW**

Our “annual” Fire Prevention Show was attended by **over 4000** children this year in grades (pre-K through 2) from Lafayette, West Lafayette, Tippecanoe and Carroll School Corporations, as well as private schools and daycares in the Greater Lafayette community. State Farm Insurance continued to be a corporate sponsor of this event. Once again this year, State Farm provided us with grant monies to allow us to pay the school corporations’ transportation reimbursement costs, which helps to insure we can educate as many children as possible.

### **History of the Fire Prevention Show**

The Lafayette Fire Department has targeted elementary school age children as our main target audience over the past 20 plus years.

In the mid 1980’s, members of the Fire Prevention Bureau would visit each elementary school during Fire Prevention Week and educate each school individually. In an attempt to be more efficient and effective, fire prevention education was moved to the Tippecanoe Mall and students in the Lafayette School Corporation in grades K-3, who were transported by bus to the mall and educated collectively. In the early 1990’s, the show was transferred to the Tippecanoe County Fairgrounds, where students were educated by the use of hand puppets and recorded songs. In the mid 1990’s the show had a brief hiatus at the Long Center, located in downtown Lafayette. Since 1996, the show has been held at Lafayette Jeff High School Auditorium for students in grades K-2 from Lafayette School Corporation, West Lafayette Schools, Tippecanoe County School Corporations and private Christian Schools. The format of the show changed dramatically in 1996,

when we abandoned the puppet show and substituted live characters that are portrayed by local firefighters, and formed the "Firehouse Band" which performs live music during the performances. We educate between 4000-5000 children each year during Fire Prevention Week. We have had approximately 100,000 children throughout our community and State of Indiana through our performances throughout the years.

### **TIPPECANOE COUNTY 4-H FAIR**

The Lafayette Fire Department participated once again in public education at the Tippecanoe County 4-H Fair in July. The Fire Prevention Division sets up a booth in the exhibitor tent and hands out free fire helmets, stick-on badges and coloring books to children that show up at the booth must answer a fire safety question to receive his or her prize. Fire safety material and smoke alarm request forms are available for adults to review and take home.

### **JUVENILE FIRE SETTER PROGRAM**

The LFD Juvenile Fire Setter Program is a program of education and evaluation. It is designed to teach children and parents that matches and lighters are tools, not toys. A child who demonstrates interest or curiosity about fire should be provided with information and education as soon as possible. Our staff is able to conduct an evaluation interview with both the parent(s) and child, to

help determine why the child is interested in fire. The program also is able to determine if the curiosity can be controlled by the parent or if additional counseling is needed through professionals. In an effort to better serve our community, our staff networks with other juvenile fire setter programs throughout the state to identify new and better ways to educate and inform these children.

### **FREE SMOKE ALARM and CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTOR PROGRAM**

We continued to offer free smoke alarms to members of our community and new in late 2017 the Lafayette Fire Department began offering carbon monoxide detectors. For people who qualify free smoke alarms and/or carbon monoxide detectors are provided and installed by on-duty firefighters to insure that each home is equipped with the proper number and locations of these life-saving devices. Also, we have a limited number of smoke alarms for the hearing impaired that are available.

This program is made possible through a partnership with the Historic Five Points Fire Museum and grant funds provided by North Central Health Services.

Lafayette Firefighters installed 306 free smoke alarms and 6 carbon monoxide detectors in the homes throughout the year. The Lafayette Fire Prevention Division conducted a “Smoke Alarm Blitz” in the Wabash Avenue Corridor, where firefighters knocked on doors and offered to test and replace/install smoke alarms if needed. This 4 hour event resulted in the installation of 172 smoke alarms.

The Lafayette Fire Department also partnered with American Red Cross in offering a “Smoke Alarm Blitz” to the Edgelea Neighborhood. This event paired Red Cross and community volunteers with Lafayette firefighters to canvas a predetermined neighborhood area and replace or install smoke alarms provided by the American Red Cross.

### **Building and Fire Code Enforcement (Existing Buildings)**

One of the major functions of local government is to provide a reasonable degree of safety for the citizens it governs. This mindset is ever present for the members of the Fire Prevention Division, who understand that unsafe buildings pose an inherent risk to both citizens and responding firefighters. In fact, a majority of the building and fire code laws in effect today came into existence to address and correct unsafe building designs and housekeeping practices.

Our inspections encompass existing buildings that are required to meet minimum building and fire codes in effect at the time they were constructed, and there are approximately 4259 business occupancies in the City of Lafayette. Additionally, we inspect all new construction projects to insure that they meet the current code requirements.

As part of the Building and Code Enforcement, the staff assigned to the Fire Prevention Division attends training seminars and have professional memberships/certifications, which include the International Code Councils Fire Inspector 1 and Fire Inspector 2 certifications, among others.

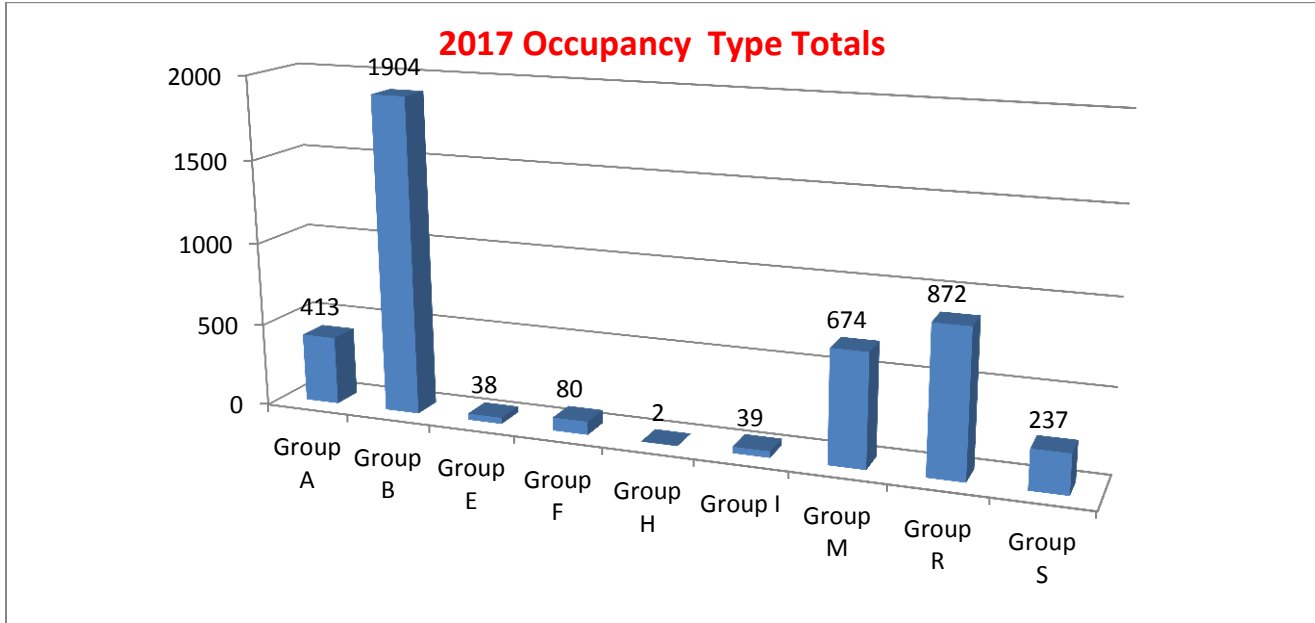

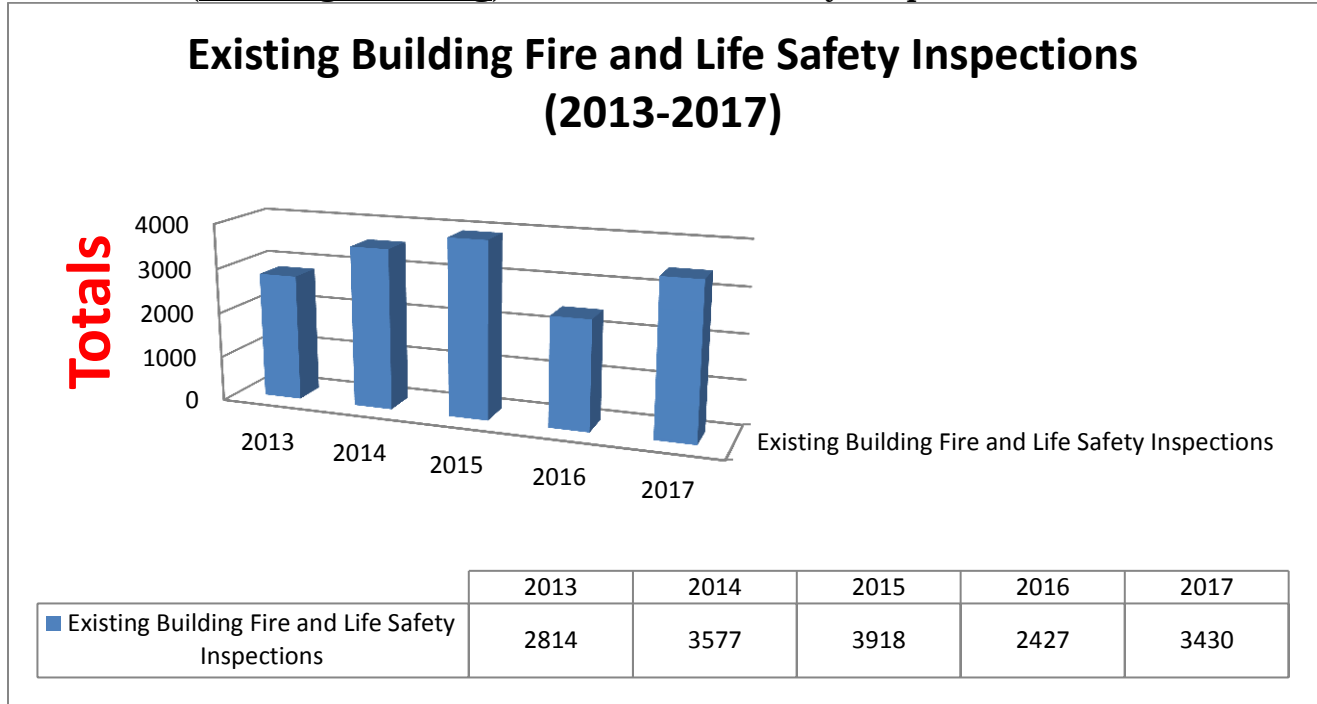

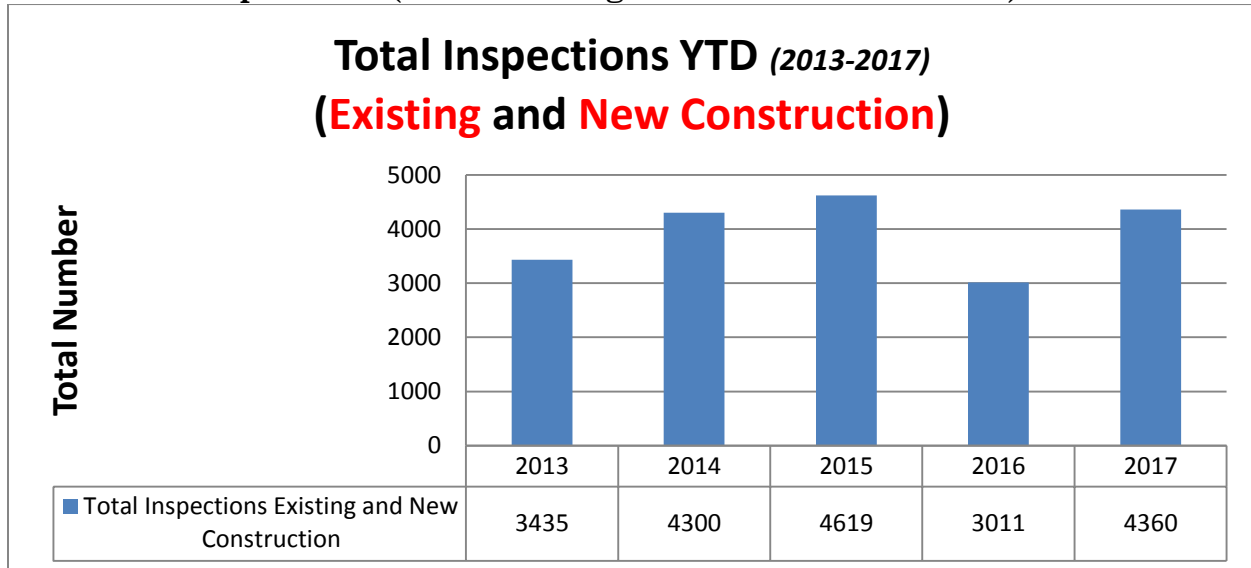

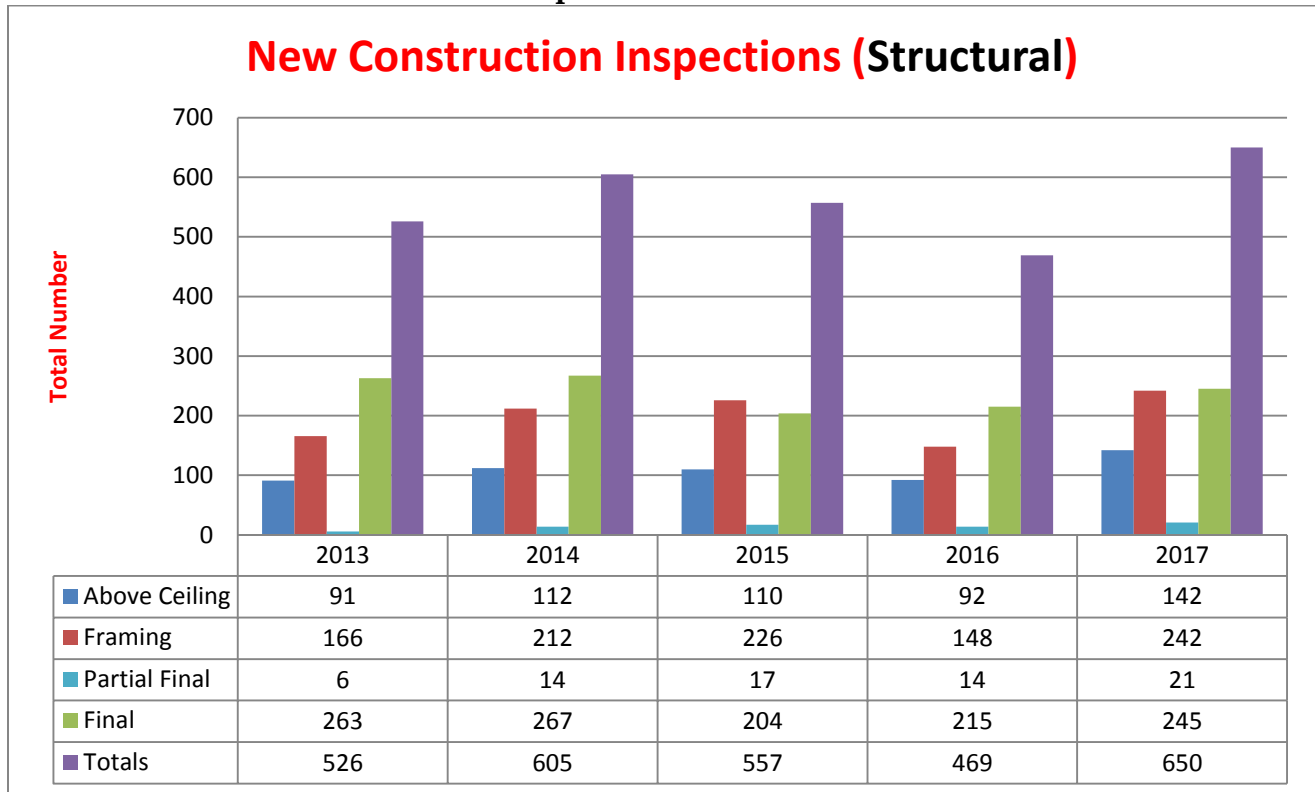
**3430 Total (Existing Building) Fire and Life Safety Inspections for 2017**



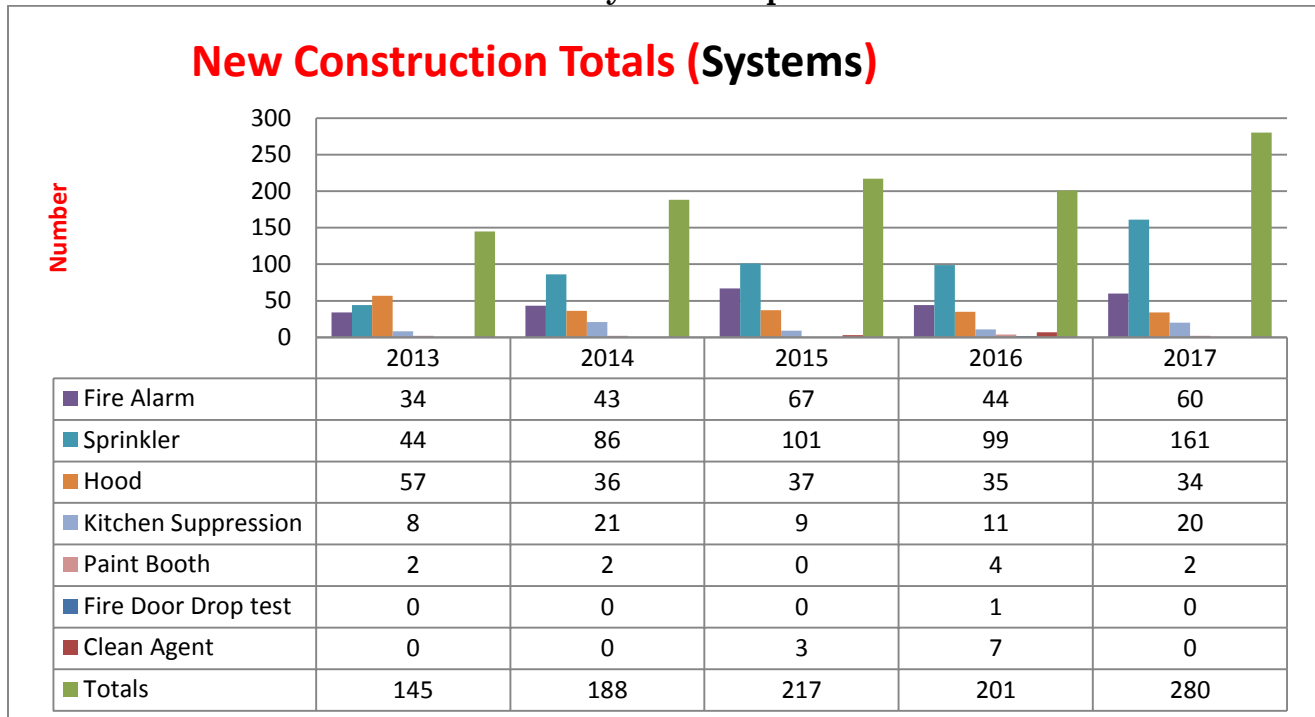
**4360 Total Inspections (both Existing and New Construction) for 2017**



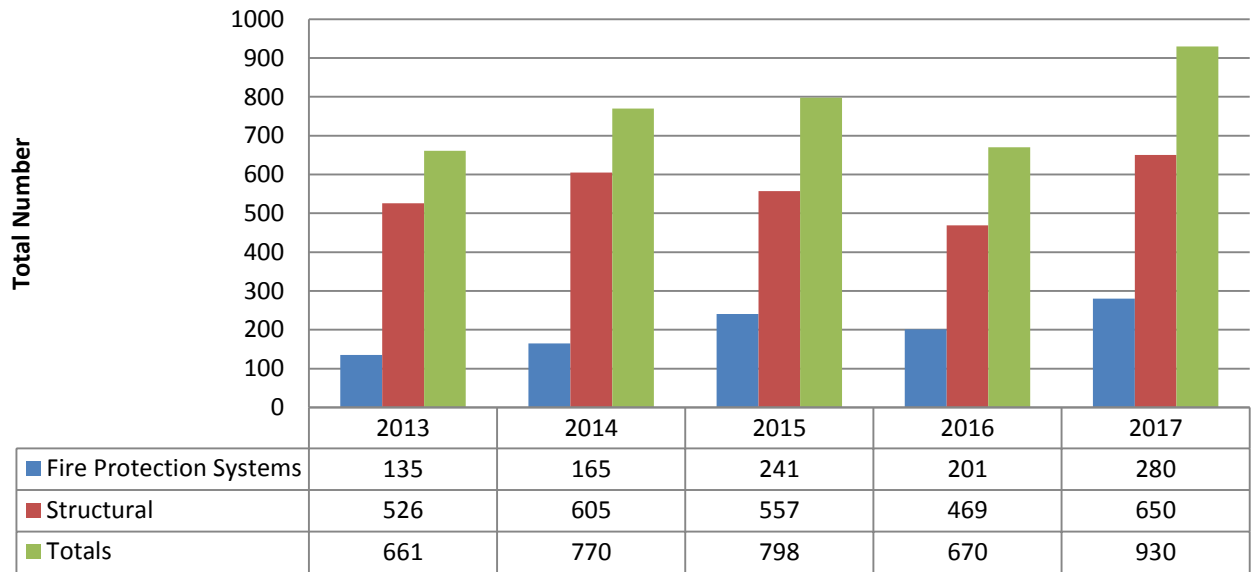
**New Construction Structural Inspections for 2017: 650**

### *Plan Review and Inspections involving (New Construction Projects)*

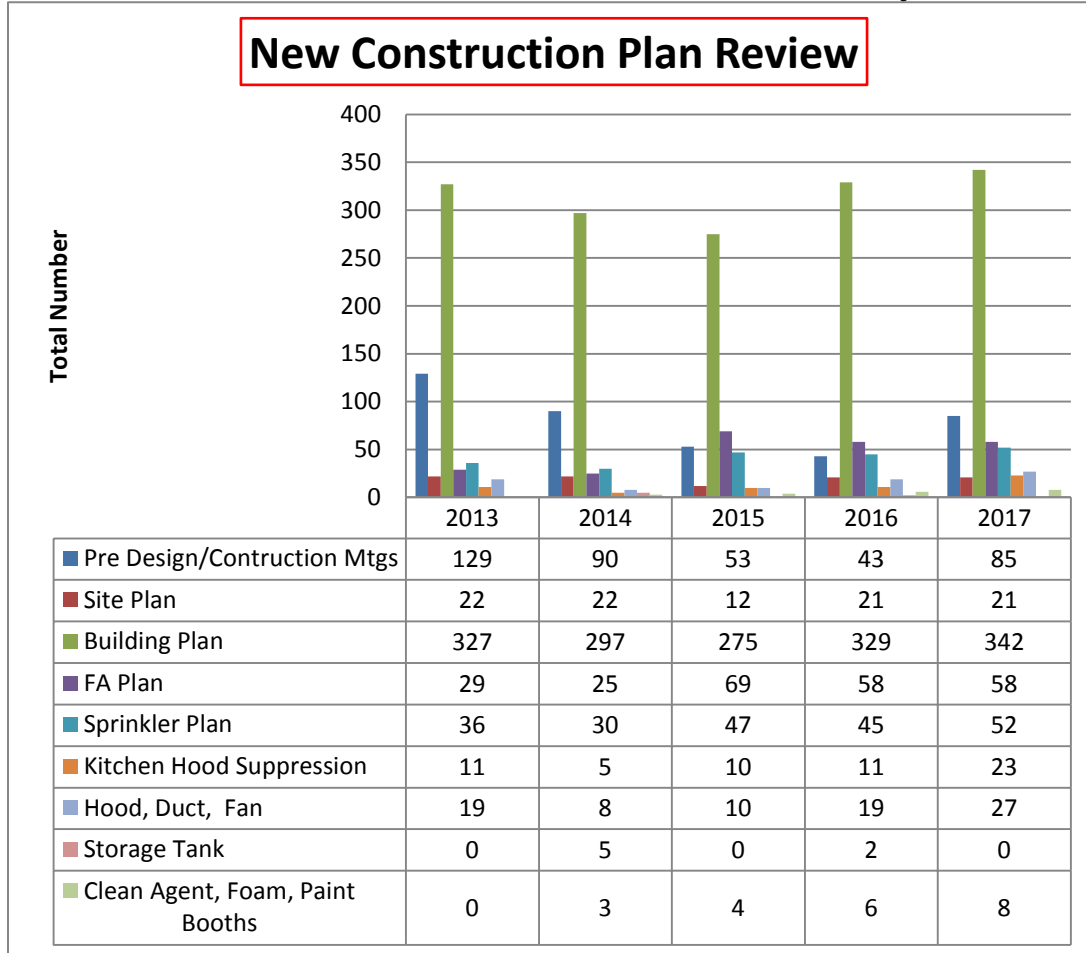
Most new construction projects are required to be filed with the State of Indiana and our City Engineers Office to obtain necessary permits to begin construction. We conduct plan reviews of all new construction, and strive to conduct very thorough reviews at the initial phases of construction to help eliminate potential conflicts at the end of the projects. Often times, this will require us to meet personally with architects, building owners, and project managers in pre-construction conferences. We believe that the benefits and rewards of spending time at the front of a project provides ample justification for the costs incurred, and assists the building owner in avoiding potentially costly renovations at the end of their projects.

Our Fire Prevention Staff reviews and inspects all pertinent fire code issues, including but not limited to:

- Building Plans
- Sprinkler Systems
- Fire Alarm Systems
- Kitchen Hood Systems

Our goal is to work with Architects/Engineers, Building Owners, and Contractors to identify corrections at the beginning of the process, to help all parties eliminate costly amenities at the end of the project.

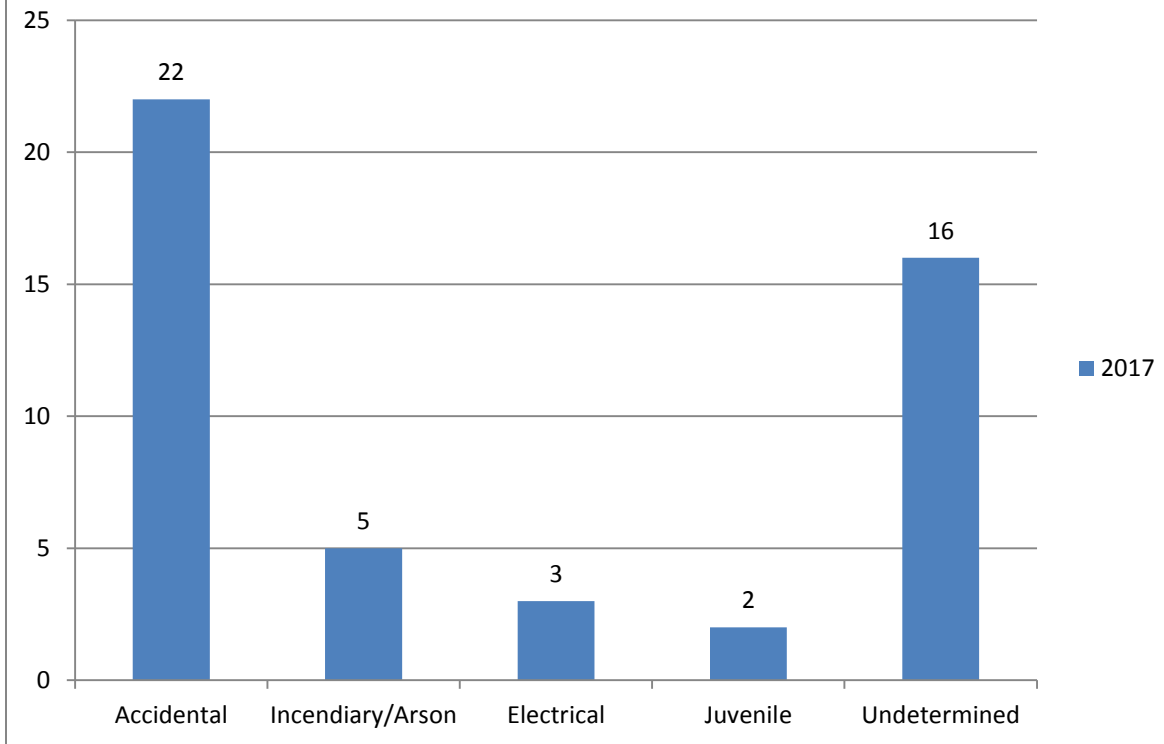


**Fire and Explosion Investigations**

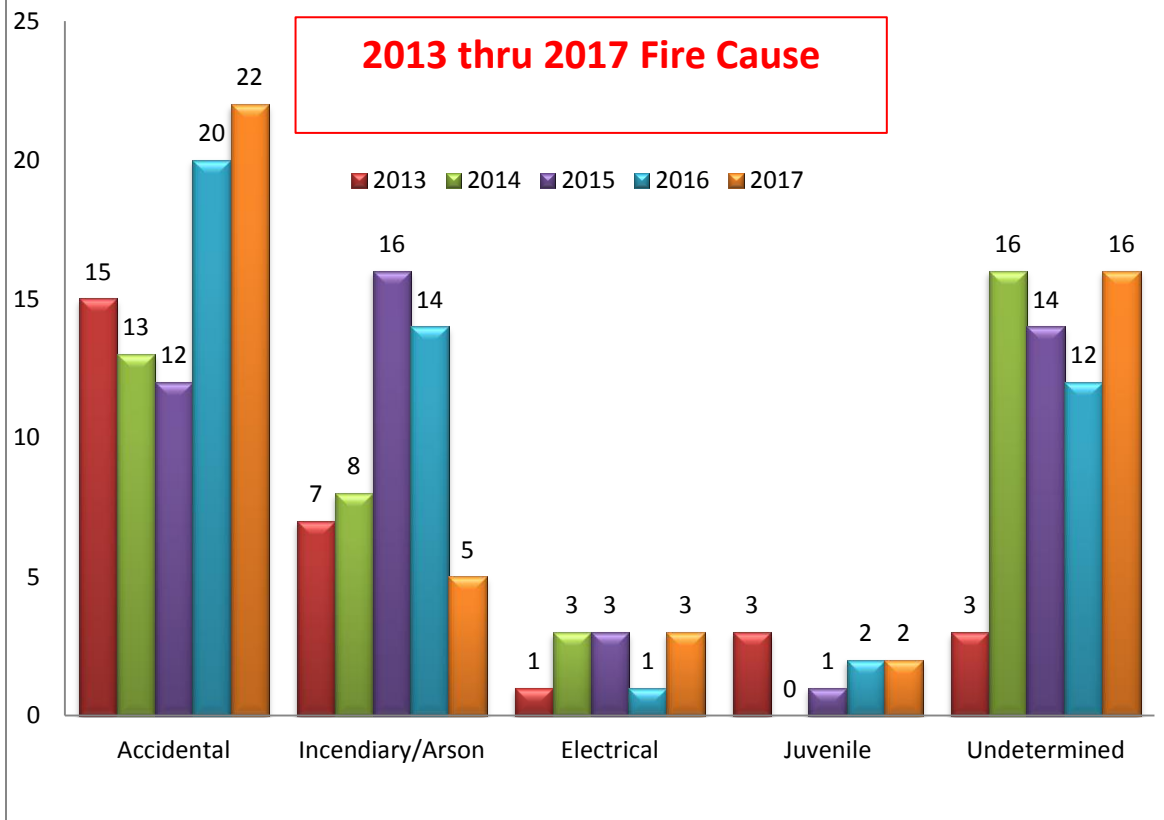
Members assigned to the Lafayette Fire Investigations Unit have the responsibility to investigate the “cause and origin” of residential/commercial structure fires and vehicle fires when requested by the Battalion Chief of Suppression. Additionally, we respond to and investigate incidents that involve natural gas explosions. Our investigators attend professional training seminars and have professional memberships/certifications, which include the International Association of Arson Investigators (IAAI) and National Association of Fire Investigators (NAFI). These organizations provide opportunities for training and networking with other investigators throughout the state. Certifications available through these organizations include: Certified Fire Investigator (CFI), Certified Fire and Explosion Investigator (CFEI), Fire Investigation Technician (FIT), among others.



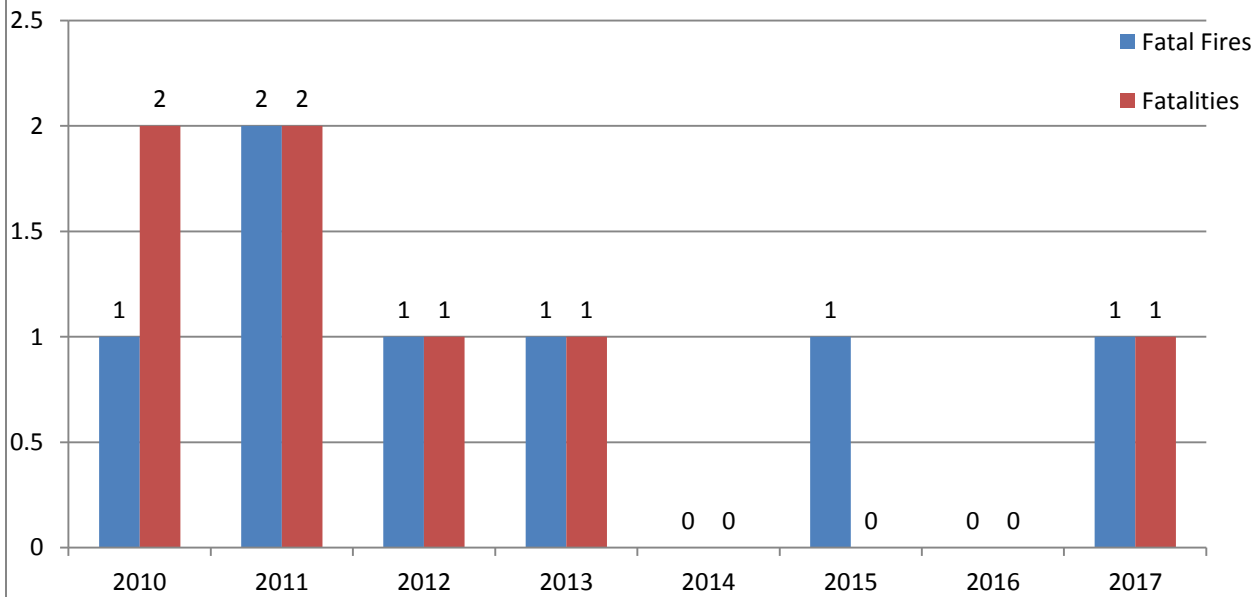
## 2017 Fire Causes



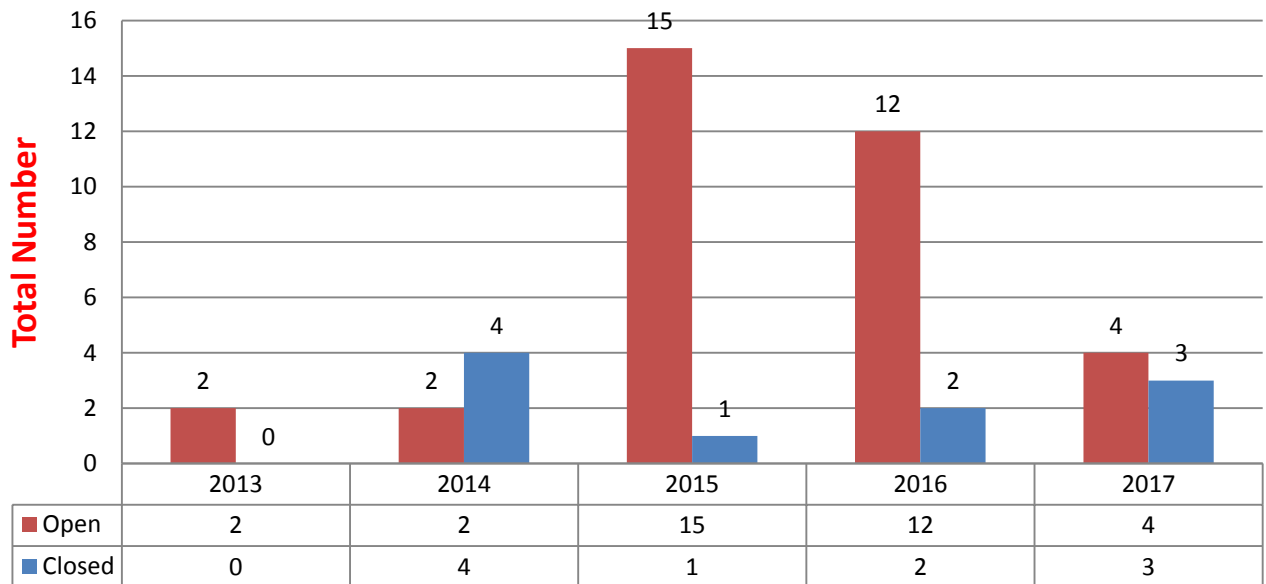
## 2013 thru 2017 Fire Cause



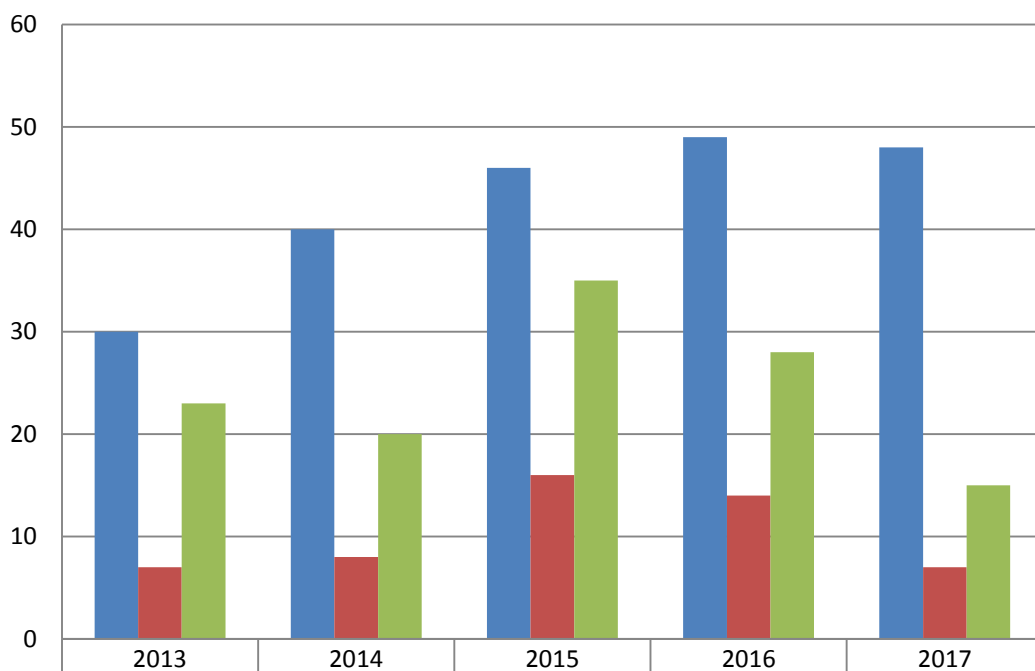
## FATAL FIRES (2010-2017)

### **2017 Investigation Report Data**

The Lafayette Fire Investigations Unit investigated **48** fires for the year. Of those 48 fires, 44 were fires involving structures and 4 involving vehicle fires. 7 of those fires investigated in 2017 involved Incendiary act or Arson representing **15% of all fires investigated in 2017**. 1 fire investigated resulted in 1 civilian fire fatality.

### **Fire Prevention Division Training**

In 2017, 290 hours of training were reported by personnel in the fire prevention division. This training and continuing education is an integral part of keeping up with the requirements and expectations of our community and for certifications and/or accreditations of the organizations that personnel are members.

A highly sought after certification is the International Association of Arson Investigators (IAAI) Certified Fire Investigator (CFI). In order to achieve the certification of IAAI Certified Fire Investigator, an applicant must meet a minimum score on the application prior to be eligible to challenge the written certification exam. One requirement of the application is that the applicant must testify as an expert witness, as to the point of origin or cause of a fire or explosion on a minimum of 2 occasions or successfully complete the IAAI Expert Witness Courtroom Testimony Course. This intense two and half day course requires more than 40 hours of preliminary case work to prepare and submit prior to the start of class.

- At Large scale fire events, our staff is called upon to fill positions of incident command which include safety officer, accountability officer, etc.
- Special /Administrative Investigations; Employee Background Checks.

**Live Fire Training**

The Training Division is located at 2070 South 500 East, just north of the SIA automotive plant in Lafayette. It is managed by Training Chief Chris Gorbett and Training Captain David Stanley, along with many other on and off-shift certified trainers. The training division not only provides training for our department's members, but also for other outside agencies throughout the year. This location is the site of an IDHS District training ground, and is also a certified Blue Card Hazard Zone Management Training Facility.

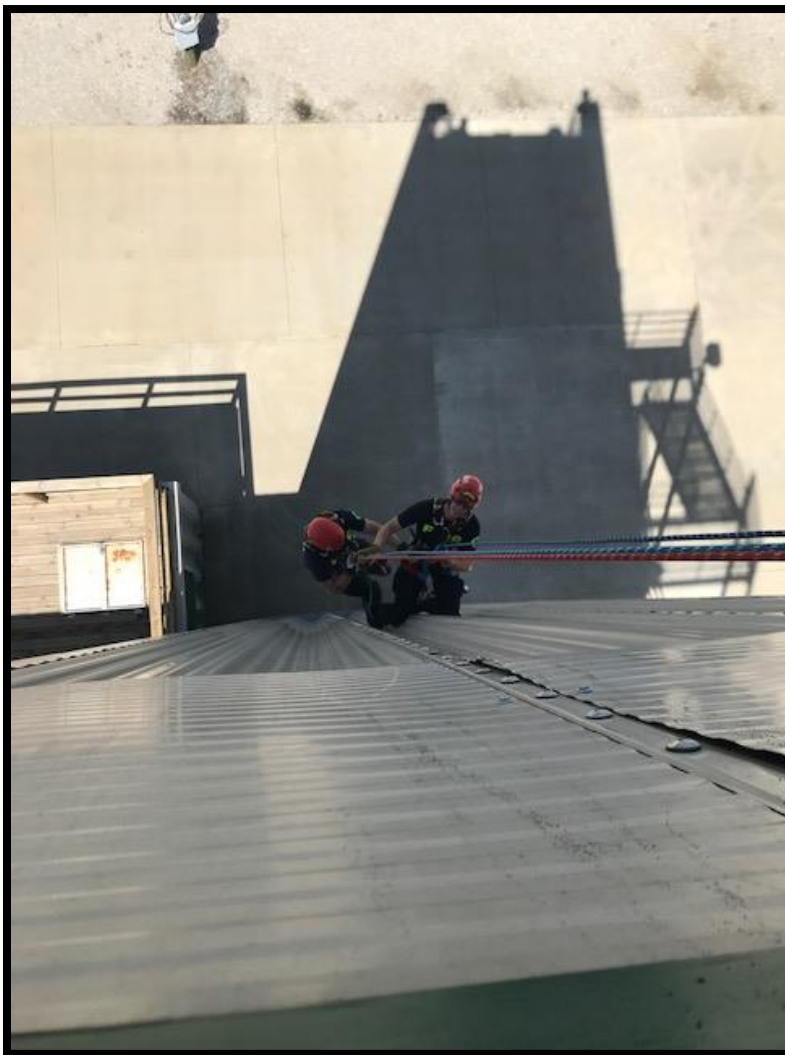


**2017 Recruit Class**

The Lafayette Fire Department welcomed 7 new recruits in 2017. We combined with West Lafayette Fire Department to have the first joined academy between the two cities. West Lafayette Fire Department sent one student and some instructors to assist with the 16-week academy that consisted of Hazardous Material Awareness, Hazardous Material Operations, Hazardous Material Technician, Firefighter I, Firefighter II, Technical Rescue Awareness, Driver Operator Pumper and Emergency Medical Technician. We completed the first Recruit Academy 24 hour shift during the shift we try and prepare the recruit for the mental and physical aspect of the job.

The Special Operations Division continued its growth and progression in 2017. We continue to maintain our professionalism and competence through education and training. All 3 teams acquired new equipment to help facilitate and enhance our performance for the City of Lafayette, as well as Indiana District 4.

Late in 2016 we applied for the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation Grant. We were notified in early 2017 that we had been awarded \$20,376; the full amount requested. This was a huge boost for our equipment purchases. We were able to purchase several items that provide for a more efficient and safe operation for the Technical Rescue Team and Water Rescue Team.

Our Hazmat Response Team spent weeks preparing for a “LIVE” drill in conjunction with Purdue University Fire, Tippecanoe Emergency Management, TEAS, West Lafayette Fire, LPD, and all of the local media on the rail corridor beneath Reihle Plaza. This drill tested our Incident Command System and our ability to operate and cooperate with outside agencies in the case of a large scale emergency. Out of this drill came many positive and successful outcomes.



In closing, all of our teams continue to prosper and provide the excellent service the citizens of Lafayette demand. Through hands on training and continued education we will continue to set the example for all other teams to follow. All team members are volunteer servants. With their continued dedication to training and commitment to the community, we look forward to another progressive year for all of our teams.

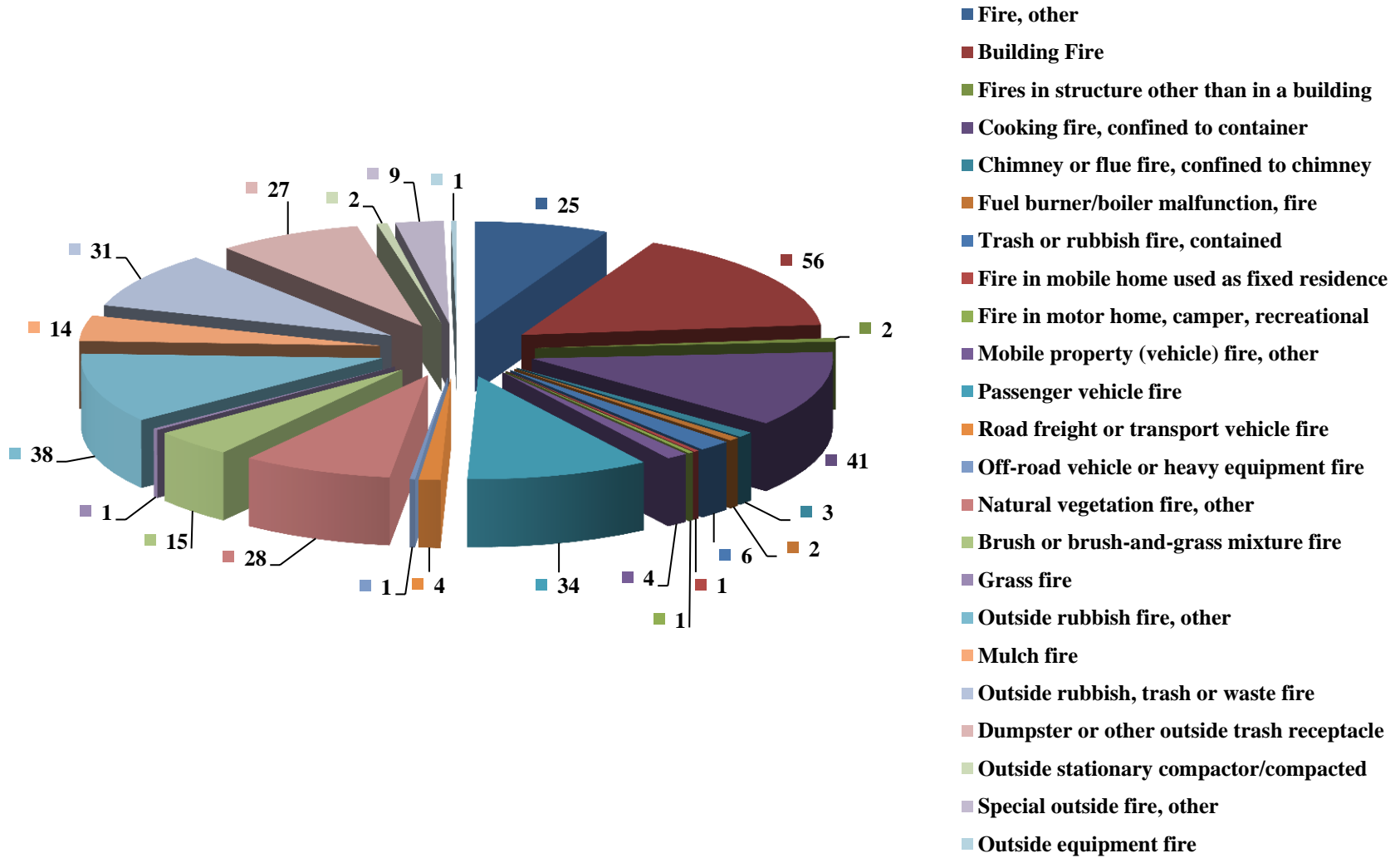

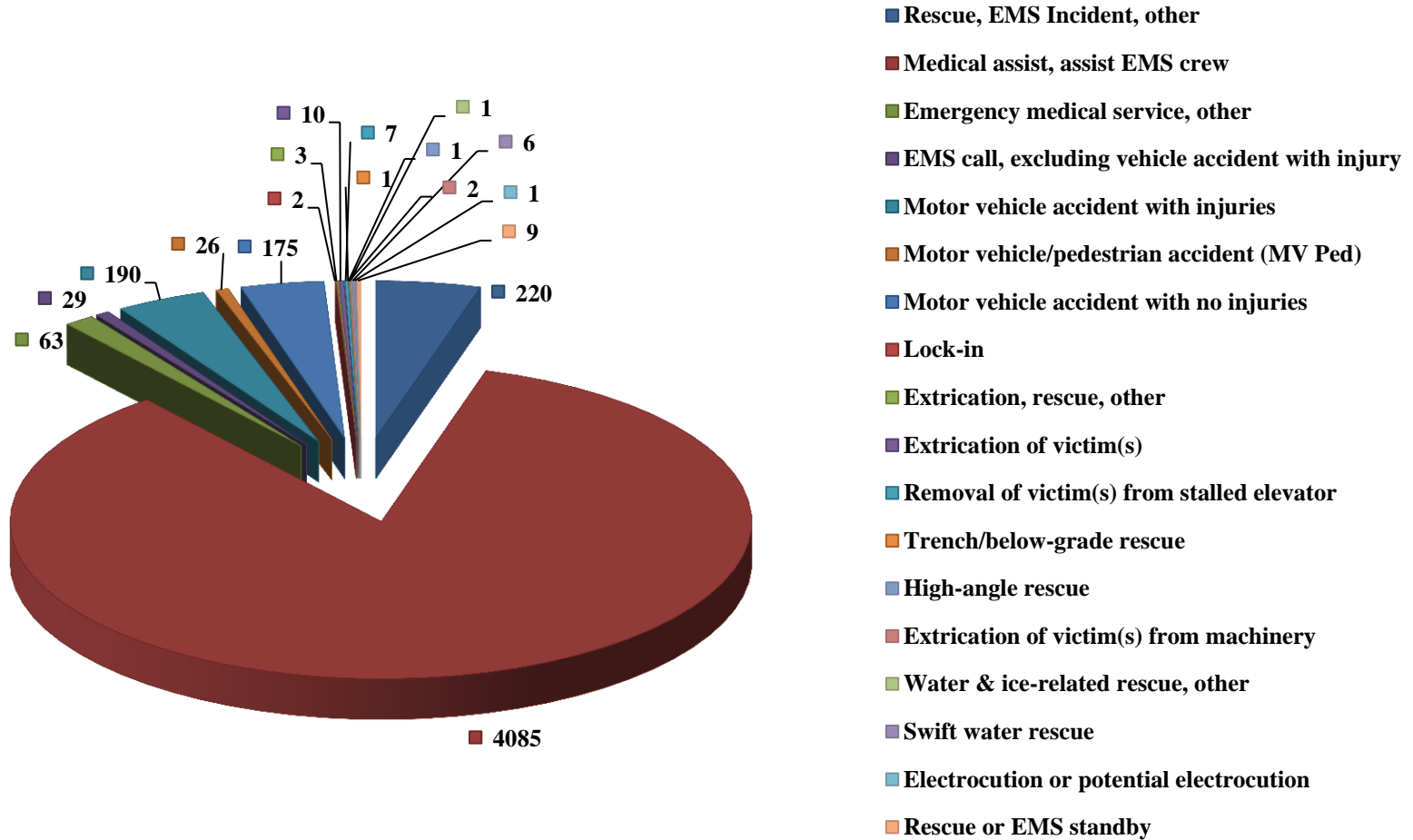

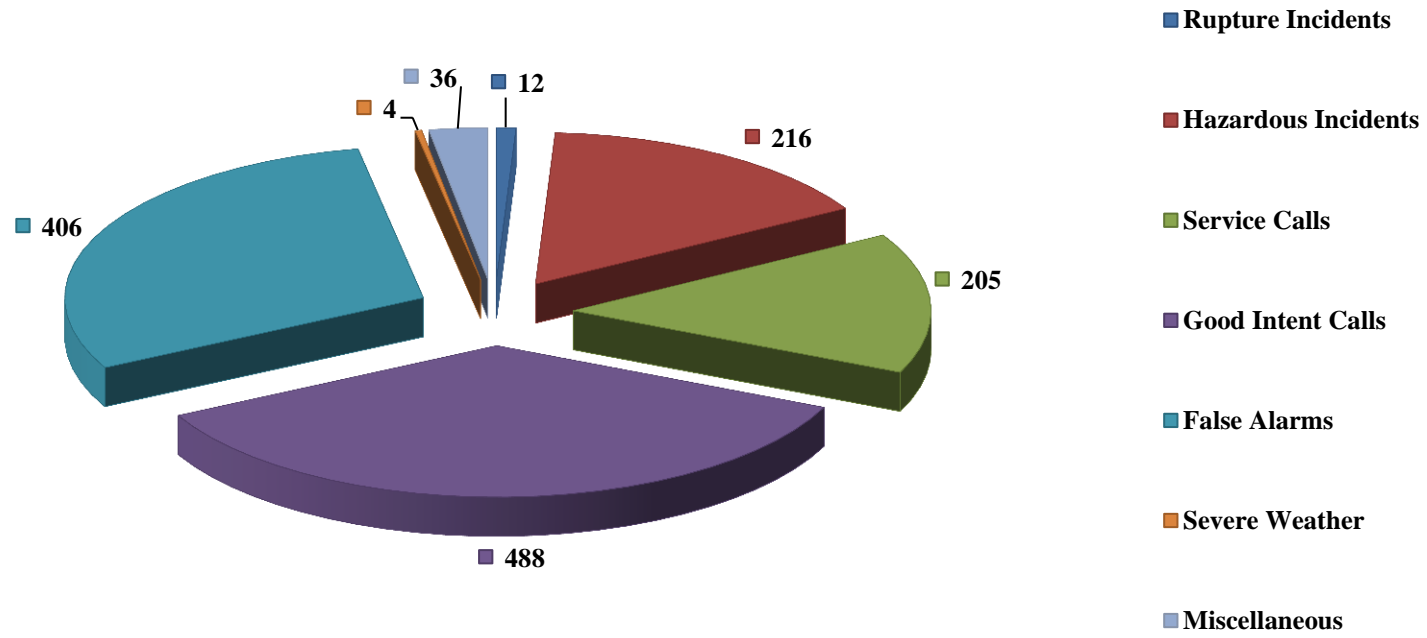
# 2017 Fire Runs



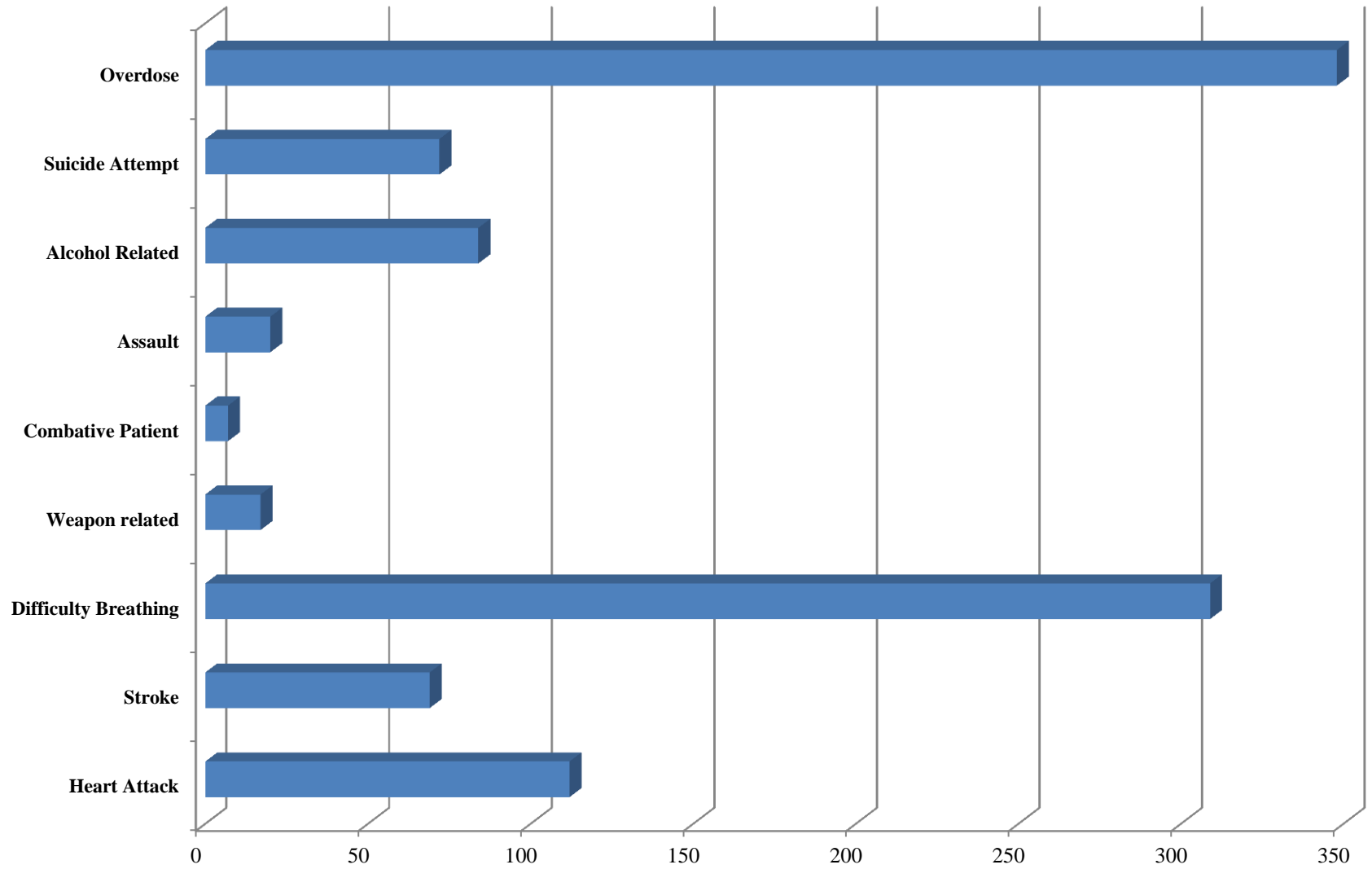
# 2017 EMS Runs



# 2017 Non-Fire Related Runs/Excluding EMS

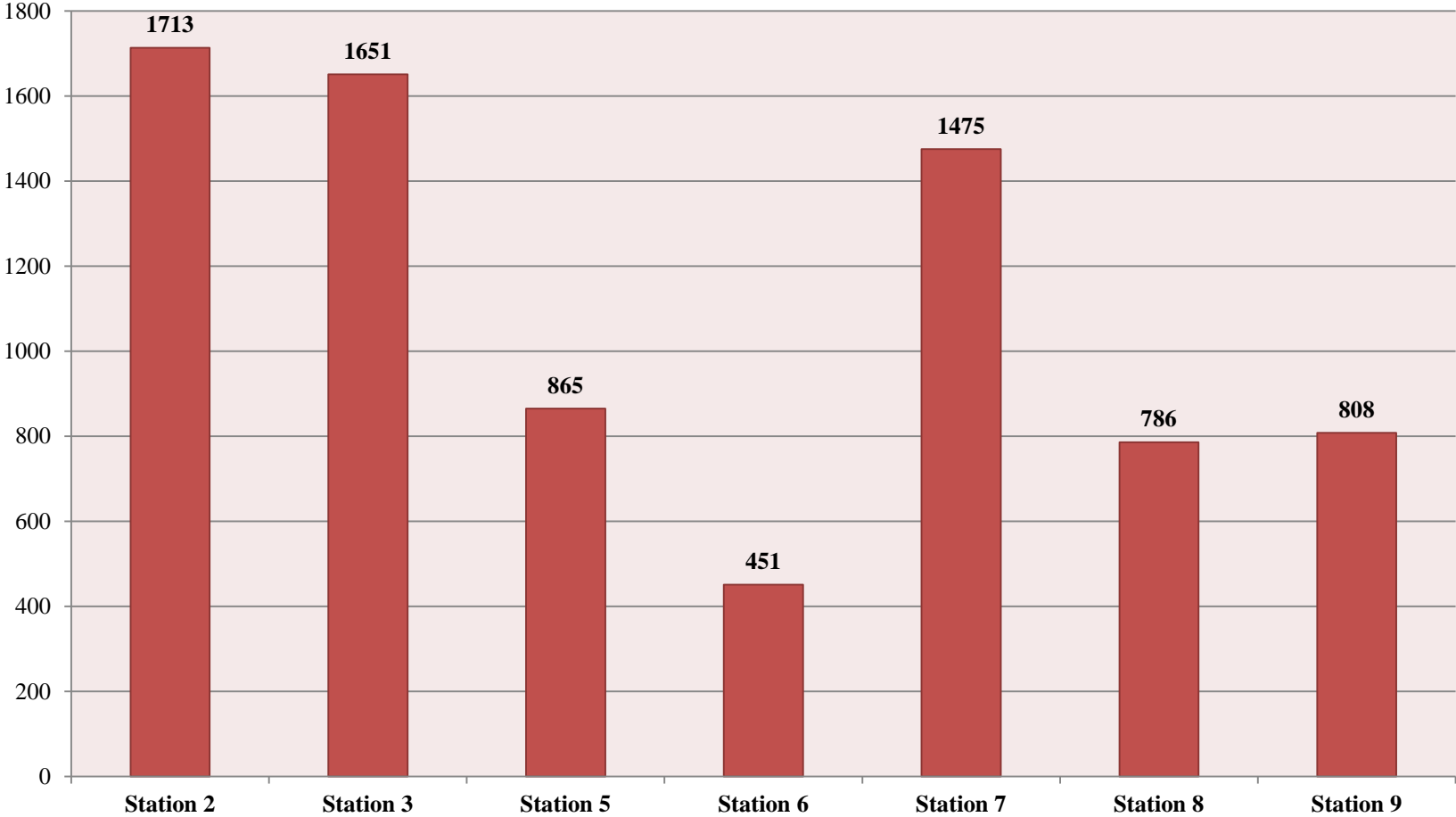


## 2017 Medical Assists - Special Categories
